#### What Is ECI?

#### **Early Childhood Intervention**

- A statewide program that provides support and services to families with children, from birth to 36 months, with developmental delays or disabilities
- Individuals with Disabilities Education Act Part C program through a grant from the U.S. Department of Education
- Statewide coverage to all eligible children
- Provides an array of services including but not limited to — therapy, specialized skills training, case management and transition



# Texas Administrative Code: Eligibility



- TAC Title 40, Part 2, Chapter 108, Subchapter H
- Children under 36 months of age and residents of Texas

 All contractors in Texas must apply the same eligibility criteria



# Types of Eligibility



- Documentation of a qualifying medical diagnosis with an identified need for services
- An auditory or visual impairment as defined by Texas Education Agency
- A developmental delay as determined by an evaluation using a standardized tool designated by HHS: the Battelle Developmental Inventory, Second Edition



## Adjusted Age

#### Adjusting age for children born prematurely

- Adjusted for children born before 37 weeks gestation
- Based on a 40-week term
- Used until the child is 18 months old
- Cannot exceed an adjustment of 16 weeks





# Medically Diagnosed Conditions

What are some of the medically diagnosed conditions for automatic ECI eligibility?

- Extremely low birth weight (P07.01-P07.03)
- Intraventricular hemorrhage, grade 3 and 4 (P52.2)
- Neonatal withdrawal symptoms from maternal use of drugs of addiction (P96.1) and withdrawal symptoms from therapeutic use of drugs in newborn (P96.2)
- Congenital hypotonia (P94.2)
- Birth injuries to peripheral nervous system: Erb's paralysis, Klumpke's paralysis, other brachial plexus birth injuries (P14.0-P14.3)
- Spina bifida (Q05.0-Q05.9)
- Arnold-Chiari syndrome (Q07.0)

## Auditory or Visual Impairment

- A child who has an auditory or visual impairment as defined by the Texas Education Agency qualifies for ECI.
- This is determined by a team that includes certified staff from your local independent school district.





# Developmental Delay

- Developmental delay: A child who has a developmental delay of at least 25 percent in one or more domain (using BDI-2)
  - If the delay is in expressive language only, the delay must be at least 33 percent
- Qualitative determination of delay (QDD)
  - Hawaii Early Learning Profile (HELP)
  - Same percentages apply





#### How to Refer to ECI



#### Anyone can refer a child to ECI

- Use the "ECI Program Search" at <a href="https://citysearch.hhsc.state.tx.us/">https://citysearch.hhsc.state.tx.us/</a> to locate the program in your area.
- Call the HHS Office of the Ombudsman at 877-787-8999, choose a language and then select option 3.
- Submit an online request to the Office of the Ombudsman. Include your ZIP code, county or city to help identify your local ECI program.



## Physicians Referring to ECI



- The ECI Referral Form is available on the Texas Pediatric Society website at <a href="https://txpeds.org/eci">https://txpeds.org/eci</a>.
  - ➤ Send medical record including any diagnosis, hearing or vision loss, and/or any screenings you may have completed; or
  - >Call or fax concerns to your local ECI program; or
  - Send the referral with the parent and provide the parent with the local ECI provider information.
- Federal regulations require professionals to refer to ECI

#### WIC and NICU can work together

WIC is a supplemental nutrition program that assists pregnant, breastfeeding and postpartum women and children up to age 5. Clients get help with eating well, learning about nutrition and staying healthy.



# TEXAS Health and Human Services

#### **WIC Services**

- Nutrition assessment and education
- Nutritious foods
- Breastfeeding support
- Breast pumps including hospital grade pumps to establish a milk supply
- Infant formula when needed
- Immunization assessment
- Counseling with registered dietitians to monitor growth

#### **WIC Services**

- Referrals to:
  - > Health providers
  - > Medicaid/SNAP/Texas Health Steps
  - > Community resources
